


Lesson to be used for language videos (Approx. 30 minutes)

LG—language guide, your immigrant or refugee background neighbor

Activity/vocab	Procedure:	Gather
<p>1.Greeting/goodbye</p>	<p>Ask LG a common greeting and response. Show picture 1A.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Listen to LG say the greeting at least 3 times, then have him/her break it down for you, saying each part slowly. Repeat. <p>Repeat the same process to learn a common way to say goodbye. Show picture 1C.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Listen to LG say the phrase at least 3 times, then have him/her break it down for you. Repeat. <p>Practice greeting each other and saying goodbye.</p>	<p>Picture of greeting and of leave-taking</p> 
<p>2.Listen and Show: Covid-19 nouns</p> <p>Target vocab: Toilet paper, mask, hand sanitizer, soap, groceries, Do you need_____?</p>	<p>Gather objects to represent all the nouns you want to learn. Hold up toilet paper and ask, "What is this?" LG answers in a complete sentence: "That is toilet paper."</p> <p>Hold up the mask and ask, "What is this?" LG again responds in a complete sentence: "That is a mask."</p> <p>LG now asks you if you need either of the two objects. Show your understanding by holding up the correct object. "Do you need a mask? Do you need toilet paper?" Encourage LG to use repetition and random order.</p> <p>Add a third object (hand sanitizer), asking, "What is this?" LG answers in a complete sentence.</p> <p>Now, LG asks if you need any of the three objects, asking you to identify them at random in the same method as above, with you holding up the correct object.</p> <p>Keep adding objects one at a time until all objects are learned.</p>	<p>Toilet paper, mask, hand sanitizer, soap, groceries</p>

<p>3.Total physical response</p>	<p>“Total physical response” means that you act out each word/phrase as it is said.</p> <p>Act out being sick and ask LG the word for <i>sick</i>. Then cough and ask LG the word for <i>cough</i>.</p> <p><u>Question/act out answer:</u> LG asks questions at random about your condition. <i>Are you sick? Do you have a cough?</i> Respond to each question by acting out the correct condition.</p> <p>Act out having a fever (hold hands to forehead) and ask the word for fever.</p> <p><u>Question/act out answer:</u> LG asks questions at random, now using the three symptoms. <i>Do you have a fever? Are you sick? Do you have a cough?</i> Respond to each question by acting out the correct symptom.</p> <p>Act out being tired and learn the word for <i>tired</i>.</p> <p><u>Question/act out answer:</u> LG asks questions at random about all four symptoms. <i>Do you have a fever? Are you sick? Do you have a cough? Are you tired?</i> Respond to each question by acting out the correct symptom. As with all activities, encourage repetition and asking the questions in random order.</p>	<p>Sick, cough, fever, tired</p>
<p>4. Roleplay</p>	<p>Learn the words for <i>yes</i> and <i>no</i>.</p> <p>Roleplay: Pretend the LG is calling you to check in over the phone. Example from English :</p> <p>LG: <i>Hello. How are you?</i> You: <i>I am well.</i></p> <p>LG asks various questions about your health: <i>Are you sick/have a cough/have a fever/tired?</i> You: answer <i>yes</i> or <i>no</i>. If <i>yes</i>, mimic your conditions.</p> <p>LG asks various questions about your needs: <i>Do you have toilet paper/a mask/groceries/soap/hand sanitizer?</i> You: answer <i>yes</i> or <i>no</i>.</p>	

LG: *Goodbye*

***In real life we'd encourage you to do this dialogue multiple times and eventually switch roles. Usually, our brains need to hear the language multiple times before being comfortable speaking. That is why the LG has the more difficult role in the dialogue. When you are comfortable (perhaps after another lesson where you focus on speaking the phrases), you take the harder role, asking questions to the LG.
